

The Governance Committee met monthly throughout the year to review, update, and improve board policies, processes, and job descriptions. These efforts ensure that the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario continues to meet all standards required of a non-profit corporation. All policies developed or revised by the committee during this period were reviewed and approved by the Board.

During this fiscal year, the Foundation held its Strategic Planning Session to outline goals for the next five years. Short-term, medium-term, and long-term objectives were identified to guide the organization's direction. The Governance Committee continues to focus on establishing solid policies and guidelines to develop a comprehensive succession plan; design and deliver leadership training programs; strengthen overall board governance; align all initiatives with the Foundation's strategic goals and governance priorities

Policies are reviewed on a continuous basis, and changes are identified if needed. We did totally dissect and implement a new Harassment Policy, as the verbiage was outdated. We could tell the policy was a few old.

The policies are living documents. As times change, so does the need to update our policy manual.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

As I write this report, we are awaiting the return of our audited statement for the year-end. With our new accounting software system, our records were not completed as quickly as in previous years.

The Foundation's accounting records had been maintained on a desktop version of QuickBooks since 2017. This has been upgraded to a 2025 online version. There are significantly different procedures for entering and reviewing our records, and this has been a learning curve.

The Finance Committee met monthly by Zoom to review the financial statements, comparing actual results to the budget on a year-to-date basis. The committee also provided input for an updated Work Plan.

The daily banking operations of the Foundation were moved to the TD Bank, to be with the same bank where our investments are managed. Our investment policy was reviewed with the banker responsible for our investments. In a meeting with that banker, he confirmed and documented how we are fully compliant with that policy.

My thanks to the committee members: Betty Ollerhead (5M10), Bonnie Popowich (5M11), Ryan Hamilton (5M13), and Board President Joanne Ogden. With Betty, Ryan, and Joanne retiring from the Board and Bonnie moving to a new committee, Finance will have a new face for 2025-2026.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the directors of Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Incorporated,

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Incorporated, which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2025, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Incorporated as at June 30, 2025, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements whether due to
 fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
 evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
 detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,
 as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override
 of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cause significant doubt on the entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosure are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended June 30, 2025

1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Inc. is a corporation without share capital, incorporated in 1981 under the laws of Canada. The corporation is a registered charity under section 149 of the Income Tax Act (Canada) and is therefore exempt from income tax. The organization's mission is to support, promote, and foster programs for the benefit of both children and adults that are in need of assistance who live in communities throughout Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements of the organization have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and liabilities are at amortized cost unless otherwise noted. Financial assets and liabilities measured at amortized cost consist of cash, restricted cash, receivables and accounts payable.

It is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant credit, currency, interest rate, liquidity or market risks arising from these financial instruments, unless otherwise noted.

Investments

The organization uses the fair value method to record investments traded on an active market. Unrealized gains and losses are reported in income.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended June 30, 2025

Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost and are being amortized on the declining balance basis at the following rates based on estimated useful life, except in the year of acquisition, when one-half of the rate is used:

Computer hardware	20%
Furniture and fixtures	20%

Amortization of leasehold improvements is recorded over the term of the lease.

The organization reviews capital assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Unrestricted donations are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are recognized.

Rental, fundraising and investment income are recorded when earned.

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements, as well as reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the estimated useful life of capital assets. These estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty, and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

Contributed services and materials

A substantial number of volunteers contribute a significant amount of their time each year. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair market value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Contributed materials which are used in the normal course of the organization's operations and would otherwise have been purchased are recorded at their fair value at the date of contribution if fair value can be reasonably estimated.


HELPING HANDS: NO ONE HAS TO FACE IT ALONE

At the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario, our Helping Hands Program is all about supporting individuals and families when unexpected health challenges arise.

We know that medical needs don't always fit within Provincial Health Care coverage, and the financial burden can feel overwhelming. Helping Hands exists to ease that pressure and make sure no one feels alone in their time of need.

Through this program, we offer assistance with:

- Medical equipment such as walkers, wheelchair components, medical supplies and other mobility aids;
- Home accessibility upgrades, including safety rails, floor poles, accessible showers, and vehicle mobility supports
- Medical travel costs, helping families cover accommodation, fuel, and meals when care requires travel



In the 2024-2025 fiscal year, Helping Hands provided **\$18,093.37** in support to individuals and families across Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario.

This was made possible through:

- \$9,953.65 in donations from Lions Clubs in Winnipeg, West St Paul, Grunthal, Brandon
 Wheat City, Flin Flon and Vermillion Bay.
- \$8,139.72 in matching funds from the Foundation

Each request we receive through Helping Hands is reviewed with care, and we do our very best to support every applicant. Our goal is simple: to make life a little easier during moments when help matters most.

GIVING GLANCES: YOUR SIGHT IS OUR VISION

The Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario is dedicated to supporting people affected by vision loss in achieving their goals with minimal disruption. We support programs for those with vision impairments or related issues, providing early detection, financial assistance, and access to vision care.

In partnership with Lions Clubs, the Lions Foundation operates **KidSight**, a quick, non-invasive vision screening program for children. The Foundation now uses ten specialized cameras, including one newly purchased this fiscal year, to support screenings across the region.

From July 2024 to June 2025, our dedicated volunteers screened over **20,000** children, helping identify potential vision issues early. About **20%** were referred to a specialist, a clear reminder of why regular vision screening is an absolute must.

The Foundation provides financial support for a range of vision-related needs, including vision therapy, specialized lenses, and eye prosthetics. In the 2024–2025 fiscal year, the program offered **\$8,624.50** in assistance, with \$4,312.25 contributed by Lions Club case donations and \$4,312.25 matched by the Foundation. In addition, we continue our partnership with LensCrafters through the OneSight program, providing free glasses to individuals in need.

Community Eye Screening For Children

The Foundation collects donated eyewear, sorts it, and ships it to the Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre (CLERC). From there, the glasses are distributed worldwide to communities in need. In 2024–2025, we shipped **59,139** pairs of glasses to CLERC.

Through Giving Glances, the Lions Foundation ensures that individuals of all ages have access to the eye care and resources they need to see clearly and live fully.

SIMPLY SOUND: WE ARE "HEAR" FOR YOU

In the 2024–2025 fiscal year, the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario took an important step forward in hearing health by purchasing three new **GSI Corti** portable audiometric devices. These handheld, professional devices allow us to screen for and diagnose hearing loss in infants, children, and adults. This investment marks the beginning of our KidsHear initiative, modelled after our successful KidSight program.

Through KidsHear, in partnership with local Lions Clubs, we will offer fast, contact-free hearing screenings at schools, daycares, and community events. The goal is simple: to prevent hearing loss, enable early diagnosis, and ensure timely treatment for children in our communities. Plans are underway to provide certified training for future volunteers, ensuring every screening is conducted professionally and safely.

Our commitment extends beyond screenings. We collect, sort, and recycle hearing aids, giving them a second life for those in need. In 2024–2025, we collected nearly 200 used hearing aids.

We also provide financial assistance for individuals who require hearing aids but do not qualify for federal, provincial, or private health programs. Donated hearing aids are refurbished and tuned with the help of our partners, ensuring they meet the unique needs of each applicant. Last year, the program provided **\$1,800** in support for these needs, with \$900 contributed by Lions Clubs and \$900 matched by the Foundation.

From KidsHear screenings to hearing aid collection and financial assistance, Simply Sound reflects our commitment to service, compassion, and making a tangible difference in the lives of those we support.


SERENITY SUITES: A HOME AWAY FROM HOME

When life brings medical challenges, travel and uncertainty can add extra weight to an already difficult journey. Serenity Suites was created to help lift some of that burden — offering a comfortable, affordable home away from home for individuals and families coming to Winnipeg for medical care.

Whether guests arrive for their own treatments, to support a loved one, or to visit someone in hospital care, Serenity Suites provides more than just accommodation — it offers a sense of peace, privacy, and compassion. Rates for a one-night stay vary depending on the length of the visit, with prices starting as low as \$70 per night for stays longer than a month. Each stay includes complimentary Wi-Fi, cable, and laundry services.

This year, the program expanded its capacity with two new fully furnished one-bedroom apartments, bringing the total to seven. Every suite is thoughtfully equipped with a queen-sized bed, a full kitchen, and a cozy living space. Some also feature fold-out sofas, providing extra comfort for families traveling with children.

During the 2024/2025 fiscal year, Serenity Suites welcomed guests from seven provinces across Canada, with the majority (68.29%) from coming communities throughout Manitoba. On average, staved quests 21 days, together, the suites were occupied for an impressive 1,130 nights.



Behind each stay is a story — of care, courage, and community. Serenity Suites continues to stand as a quiet haven where healing begins, and where kindness makes every stay feel a little more like home.



JOURNEY FOR SIGHT: A LEGACY IN MOTION

Since its beginning in 1983, Journey for Sight has become one of the most cherished traditions within the Lions community. A winter ride that blends adventure, service, and compassion in support of those in need.

In January 2025, a team of 11 dedicated riders once again braved Manitoba's winter trails, covering hundreds of kilometres across the province during their weeklong fundraising journey.

Their commitment, teamwork, and generosity of spirit resulted in more than \$53,000 raised in support of the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario's essential programs. What started as a small, local effort almost 40 years ago has grown into a movement that has raised over \$2.5 million to date.

LIONS STOVES: BRINGING WARMTH TO UKRAINE

In 2024, Lions across Canada once again joined forces to bring warmth and hope to families in Ukraine.

In its third year, the Winter Is Coming to Ukraine initiative continued to deliver Lions Stoves. These high-quality, steel heating and cooking units are designed to withstand harsh conditions and bring comfort to those living in the shadow of war. Each stove provides not only heat but also a way to cook meals, offering families a sense of normalcy amid ongoing uncertainty.

Throughout the spring and summer, further development and testing took place to enhance the stoves' efficiency. The latest models can now burn wood, pellets, briquettes, and coal, ensuring greater flexibility for families across different regions.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of Lions and supporters across Canada, \$51,245 was raised — enough to provide at least 205 stoves. That means at least 205 Ukrainian families now have the means to cook hot meals and heat their homes through the winter.

We're proud to stand together with LCIF in making this initiative possible. This project reflects what Lions do best, working together to bring real help where it's needed most.

As winter approaches once again, the call to help continues. Together, we can keep the fires of hope burning for hundreds more families in Ukraine, bringing warmth, comfort, and a reminder that they are not alone.
